Welcome to homeopathy. As you know I am a licensed homeopath and not a licensed medical physician. It is recommended that you inform your medical doctor that you are receiving homeopathic treatment. If you ever have any concerns about the nature of your treatment, please feel free to discuss them with me.

THEORY OF HOMEOPATHY

Homeopathy is a systematic, scientific method of therapy that aims to promote health by reinforcing the body's own natural healing capacity. The mental, emotional, and physical aspects of a person are very important, and a remedy is selected based on the totality of the symptoms expressed in these areas. Improvement in health will be evaluated from a total view of all these areas. In a curative response to a well-selected remedy, there may be a brief intensification of the presenting symptoms and/or a temporary return of old symptoms, as the vital force is stimulated to heal.

NATURE OF SERVICES

A homeopath relies on a good understanding of the patient therefore it is important for you to be as thorough as possible in your consultation. The initial consultation can be approximately 2 hours and follow up appointments are about 15 to 45 minutes. If you have not been seen for a follow-up in a while, then it will take more time and you will may billed for an initial consultation. If you must cancel an appointment please do so at least 24 hours in advance or charges will apply.

I authorize Henry Kostecki to discuss my case with other professional homeopaths, should he need assistance in analysis. I understand that my best interest will be served by such a consultation. In doing so, my right to privacy will be protected by changing or withholding my name and all other identifying information.

CONFIDENTIALITY

Disclosure may be required in the following circumstances: a reasonable suspicion of child or elder abuse, a reasonable suspicion that the client presents a danger to him or herself or to others. Disclosure may also be required pursuant to a legal proceeding.
